January

Staff and students have been working together, led by Mrs Rathore and Mrs Reeves to raise awareness of LGBT within the school community.

With the overall aim of being more open and honest about LGBT, the school community is working towards achieving the Rainbow Flag Award. There are six areas for consideration within the award and we have achieved the first part of the award, 'Skilled teacher'.



February

3D MISSION TO MARS

A group of our students are taking part in the Gaming to Development (G2D) project; a unique and exciting opportunity in Engineering, Design and Technology where they use 3D real-time collaboration in gaming.

16 students have been selected to be part of a 6 week programme where they will be working with the CALOM Project, Epic Games and Frame store (The and Avengers VR designers) in collaboration with Cambridge University to understand and be skilled in 3D visualisation. They will engage in online-mediated 'challenge-based learning', working together remotely and in real time, using the Unreal Engine to build a virtual habitat on Mars. Immersive VR content (e.g. of the Mars landscape) will also be created.

After 6 weeks our students will have created a space on Mars, complete with buildings they can walk inside, plus space suits and other tools necessary for survival on Mars.

March

As lockdown restrictions start to ease, and students return back to school, we wanted to recognise the hard work and diligence from our parents in ensuring their children are logging into their online lessons, we have sent 50 "Hug in a Mugs" to some of our parents.

The "Hug in a Mug" is to encourage parents to sit down with a hot chocolate and some biscuits for a little bit of "me" time. The treats were generously donated Natasha Beck, Community Champion at Morrisons in Great Harwood, who heard of our appeal and kindly offered to help.

We know that a lot more than 50 parents are doing everything they can to encourage students to access their virtual learning, so to make it fair we pulled 10 names per year group out of a hat.

August

Everybody at Blackburn Central High School would like to say a massive 'Congratulations' to all of the students receiving their GCSE results today. We are so proud of the hard work and effort our students have put in, and we're glad to say it was reflected in their results.

This year, grades were determined by teachers, and then, following quality assurance, results are issued by the exam boards. Teachers take evidencebased decisions about the grade they recommend. Evidence can include, but is not limited to, mock exams, classwork and assignments.

Collectively, the school's grades this year have seen an increase, with a 6.6% increase in students achieving a grade 5 or above in English, and a 1.9% increase in students achieving a grade 5 or above in Maths. These are the highest results achieved at BCHS since the new numerical grade system was introduced.

Top achiever Saarah said "I am beyond happy and delighted. I want to thank all my teachers who have supported me through this and my family."

Saarah's Dad also commented "She's done so amazingly well, I'm so excited for her" Saarah achieved eight grade 9s and one grade 7.


September

Star of 'Educating Yorkshire', Musharaf Asghar, gives inspiring speech to BCHS students.

Musharaf, AKA 'Mushy', joined BCHS on Thursday 23 September to give a keynote presentation about how he overcame his difficulties with a stammer which held him back in his school career.

Mushy talked us through the techniques he used to ground himself and help keep focused. One techniques was to wear headphones whilst he spoke, an idea his teacher had seen on 'The King's Speech'. Mushy told us he would also call up call centres just to be able to chat to people, because they often weren't allowed to hang up.

Mushy reminded us that life is not a competition, he said "The only person you are in competition with is yourself."



October

On Monday 4th October Art teacher, Mrs Sharkey accompanied 3 year 10 girls, Nelofar, Halima and Humeira to a hotel in Wigan where many Afghani families are being house, having fled the recent conflict.

The families at the hotel fled Afghanistan with only the clothes they were wearing, they have literally left their whole life behind. People in Wigan and staff at BCHS have been extremely generous and have provided the families with more than enough clothes, toiletries and day to day items. However the one thing the children were missing were their toys, the girls particularly wanted dolls.

The 3 girls really wanted to help the children; they went out and bought dolls, jigsaws and crafts for the children. Mr Tyrie had also donated two huge bags of teddy bears, which we took along too. The children and parents were so happy with their new toys - especially the dolls!

Our 3 Y10 girls were wonderful, playing with the children and chatting to the parents, with Nelofar as our interpreter! It was a humbling and emotional afternoon for all of us, the girls were an absolute credit to BCHS.

November

The Renee Black Integration Award has been awarded to the staff and students of Blackburn Central High School for their outstanding voluntary contribution to bringing together the different communities of Blackburn with Darwen and building a shared understanding between different sections of our community.

Renee Black was a founding member of the Blackburn with Darwen Interfaith Forum who devoted much of her time to helping people learn about different cultures and religions to foster a better understanding between people.

BCHS was a new school in 2012 and now serves one of the most deprived areas in the country. With intake from a wide range of local primary schools, we have a wonderfully diverse mix of nationalities in our school community. We are so proud of how well our school community works together, bringing together many different languages, faiths, nationalities, and cultures.

Since opening, we have had over 50 different nationalities join – from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe, and 30+ languages spoken. We were mentioned in a HM Govt. Green Paper for our positive cohesion, and in 2020, we attained School of Sanctuary – the only school in BwD to do so, and now we are supporting other schools in the borough in reaching this status.



December

December saw our first Awards Assemblies of the school year.

Over 150 of our top students received awards for effort and achievement from their subject teachers. Students were gifted a multitude of prizes, including gift cards, games and chocolates.
