MEMORIAL FOR OUR BCHS FAMILY

Families, friends and staff gathered at Blackburn Central High School's Memorial Garden to remember Dylan Weir, Alison Turner, Aya Hachem and Maryam Ishtiaq.

The service opened with words from Headteacher, Shanaz Hussain, with contributions from Father Bob Hayes and Imam Mawlana Tayyab and Alison's colleague, David Woodhouse.

Also in attendance was Mayor of Blackburn with Darwen Borough Council, Councillor Derek Hardman, Councillor Tony Humphreys Chair of the Board of Governors and Derek Elliott, Vice Chair of the Board of Governors.

Dylan Weir was described as 'a very special part of the school family' when he was suddenly taken at home aged only 12. His peers remember his as 'bright, kind and funny.'

Alison Turner was a colleague and friend who worked at Blackburn Central High School for 7 years. Alison was said to have 'touched the heart of so many students' and her colleagues described her as 'a natural in the kitchen, who would brighten any room.'

Aya Hachem left Blackburn Central High School in 2016 with a very bright future ahead of her. Aya was studying Law at Salford University. Her family described her as a 'beautiful girl with a warm laugh.'

Maryam was a respected member of the Blackburn Central High School family. Many saw Maryam as more than just a friend, Maryam was often described as a loyal sister.

Headteacher Mrs Shanaz Hussain said: "It was a beautiful service that celebrated and remembered the lives of four very special members of our Blackburn Central family. It warmed my heart to hear our students and staff share so many wonderful stories."

THE RENEE BLACK INTEGRATION AWARD

The Renee Black Integration Award has been awarded to the staff and students of Blackburn Central High School for their outstanding voluntary contribution to bringing together the different communities of Blackburn with Darwen and building a shared understanding between different sections of our community.

Renee Black was a founding member of the Blackburn with Darwen Interfaith Forum who devoted much of her time to helping people learn about different cultures and religions to foster a better understanding between people.

BCHS was a new school in 2012 and now serves one of the most deprived areas in the country. With intake from a wide range of local primary schools, we have a wonderfully diverse mix of nationalities in our school community. We are so proud of how well our school community works together, bringing together many different languages, faiths, nationalities, and cultures.

Since opening, we have had over 50 different nationalities join – from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe, and 30+ languages spoken. We were mentioned in a HM Govt. Green Paper for our positive cohesion, and in 2020, we attained School of Sanctuary – the only school in BwD to do so, and now we are supporting other schools in the borough in reaching this status.

Renee Black embodied all of the beliefs that Blackburn Central High School hold dear about diversity and inclusion, about learning about each other, sharing our beliefs and coming together in unity.

Headteacher, Shanaz Hussain, said: "It is a real privilege and a real honour to accept this award on behalf of the Blackburn Central High School family. I'm proud to work in such a richly diverse school and I'm so proud of the staff and students who have worked tirelessly throughout the year to bring our communities together and to find a way to support those in need."

YEAR 11 MOCK EXAMS

Our Year 11 students will be sitting Pre-Public Exams (Mocks) after the Christmas holidays.

They will run from Monday 17th January 2022 to Friday 28th January. These exams are a good chance for our students to practice a full series of GCSE exams. In school we have been doing some preparation for the exams in Progress Time, looking at making revision timetables and practising revision techniques.

It is now time for them to use this learning at home. In addition, subject teachers will be providing revision lists in the next week so that students know what to focus on. Please could you support your child at home by checking on their revision and making sure they have no distractions.

We would like to stress the importance of these exams and encourage Year 11 to treat them as seriously as they would the real exams. This gives them to chance to reflect on their preparation and make necessary changes before the summer exams. Although the plan at the moment is that GCSE exams will go ahead as normal, the last two years have taught us that there are no guarantees and that things can change very quickly.

This is another reason to take these exams seriously as if the worst comes to the worst, we may use the grades as part of a final Teacher Assessed Grade. If we are using Teacher Assessed Grades there will still be a series of summer exams but this data will also be taken into account.
